



# Who are we?

- Each of the 44 counties in Idaho are mandated through Idaho Code Title 46-1009 to have a Emergency Management Program in their County.
- Coordinate resources during a incident/disaster with the first responding agencies.
- Manage the SHSP/EMPG Grant
- Addresses Community Preparedness efforts with our citizens
- Facilitates Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) meetings.
- File TIER II Reports in the county




# All Hazard Mitigation Plan

- Required by FEMA for the state and each county.
- To address hazards in each city/county
- To address mitigation efforts for the hazard
- To support individual city/county/regional projects with funding
- Updated every 5 years
- Partners in writing the plan: city/county officials, first responders, public works, hospitals, LE, Fire, LEPC members, citizens, volunteer agencies, schools, etc.



# The Emergency Operations Plan

- Mirrored after the National Response Plan
- Incorporates members of the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) for design and revision of the plan.
- Each tribe, county and the state, are required to have a current EOP.
- Standard Operating Guide to support/respond to incidents/disasters

# Declaration Process

- Local/County Declaration –In the event of a disaster or local emergency, the primary responsibility for responding to, recovering from, and mitigating against the effects of disaster rests with local government.
- State Declaration –when the effects of the emergency are beyond the capability of local resources to mitigate effectively.
- Federal Declaration – when the effects of the emergency are beyond the capability of the resources in the state.
- Note: Documentation of an incident is vital for reimbursement of expenses directly associated with a incident/disaster.
